More than \$3.6 million has been injected into the local economy as a direct result of the three major events at Glen Willow this year.

A combined 18,228 people made it though the gates to see the NRL Charity Shield:
South Sydney Rabbitohs v St George Illawarra Dragons (26 February), Round 4: Manly Warringah Sea Eagles v Canberra Raiders (2 April), and A-League Round 19: Central Coast Mariners v Macarthur FC (26 March).

Economic data shows 67 per cent of Manly v Canberra event attendees were visitors to the region, while 54 per cent of A-League attendees and 66 per cent of Charity Shield attendees were visitors to the region. On

average, these visitors spend \$163 a night based on a two night stay. They eat in local restaurants and cafes, stay in local motels, and shop. The flow on economic benefits of major events are among the reasons why Council works to partner with professional clubs to secure multi-year games. Based on these visitor numbers Council estimates the Manly v Canberra game generated \$1.4 million for the local economy, whilst A-League generated \$400,000 and Charity Shield \$1.8 million.

Feedback on these events has been overwhelmingly positive, with comments like: "It honestly was organised and run amazingly, I have been to every rugby league event since 2013 here in Mudgee it was no problems with gates opening times facilities offered and instructions from event staff, council workers and police were all awesome," and "The town is welcoming - the vibe is great. Our third year and it just gets better."

Council will host the Charity Shield again in 2023 with a date to be announced later this year.

AFTER REALIGNMENT

Wollar Road has reopened following an extended closure to realign two dangerous curves as part of the threeyear road safety upgrade.

Motorists should continue to exercise caution as the road remains unsealed and operating under traffic control. These works are part of the \$6.8 million Wollar Road Upgrade, jointly funded by Council and the NSW Government through its Restart NSW Fund and Saving Lives on Country Roads programs.

The project includes road widening, pavement upgrades and further safety improvements to Wollar Road between Cooyal and Cumbo within the Munghorn Gap National Park which has sadly been the location of a number of traffic incidents in recent years, including motor vehicle fatalities. It is expected the project will be completed in its entirety in June, weather permitting.

YOUNG ENTREPRENUERS SUMMIT INFORMING LOCALS

The third annual Central West Young Entrepreneurs Summit, hosted in Mudgee's newest venue, has been met with excellent feedback from both attendees and speakers.

Local business owners, students and staff in a range of industries from real estate to retail, learnt from some of Australia's most successful young entrepreneurs who grew their startups into international companies.

Hosted at the all new Mudgee Arts Precinct, more than 40 attendees heard from The Block favourites and professional renovators Kyal and Kara (pictured), cocreator of one of Australia's biggest swimwear brands Budgy Smuggler, Adam Linforth, founder of Australia's largest eco store Flora & Fauna, Julie Mathers, founding partner of bespoke food tour company Straight To The Source, Tawnya Bahr and co-founder of Knafeh/The Bearded Bakers, Ameer El-Issa.

Chief Smuggler at Budgy Smuggler, Adam Linforth took the audience on a journey from very humble beginnings in a Manly garage to now having offices in the UK.

"I would have loved something like this when I was first starting out," Adam said.

"Probably the best thing about hearing from some of the other speakers is that we talk about all the things that went wrong, and we probably learn from that as much, if not more, than what's gone right.

"There was a really good mix of young people from school-aged to people who are starting their own businesses to those who have established businesses. I've been through all those phases so I really enjoyed getting to share each of them." This year's event was proudly delivered by Council with funding through the NSW Government's Stronger Country Communities and Regional NSW Business Event Development funds.

BILLY DUNN OVAL GULGONG NEW AMENITIES

An all new amenities building has been constructed at Billy Dunn Oval in Gulgong to improve facilities for female sport.

The building includes dedicated change rooms for women, as well as toilets, showers, basins, referee's bathroom and storeroom. There were previously no suitable female amenities at the ground. This purpose-built facility will improve accessibility to sport for local women. Council secured \$122,000 in grant funding to construct the building through the NSW Government's Stronger Country Communities Fund.

LANDHOLDER GRANTS UP TO \$20,000 OPEN 2 MAY

One off-grants of between \$5000 and \$20,000 are available to landholders along the Cudgegong River and its upper tributaries to undertake rehabilitation activities on private property. Landholders and community groups are eligible for projects including revegetation, waterway clean up, weed and pest control, exclusion fencing, and installation of erosion control structures. Landholders who are willing to provide in-kind assistance (site preparation, slashing and/or

ripping, fence installation, planting and watering) and a commitment to ongoing maintenance will be highly regarded. Applications open on 2 May via Council's website (midwestern.nsw.gov.au) and close 5 June. Properties must be located within the Mid-Western Regional Council Local Government Area. The program has been funded by the Australian Government Department of Agriculture, Water and Environment Murray—Darling Healthy Rivers Program.

Serrated tussock (Nassella trichotoma) is regarded as one of the worst grass weeds within the Mid-Western Region, due to its quick-spreading ability and zero grazing value to stock. Infestations result in a significant loss in production, and dense infestations can completely dominate pastures and take over new areas within four years. Each mature plant can produce up to 140,000 seeds per year and it is estimated in NSW alone, Serrated tussock has caused losses of up to \$40 million in lost production. The optimum time for spraying is during the vegetative growth stage which is between March and June.

Invest.

Construction has commenced to reinvigorate the Rylstone Caravan Park. As part of Stage 1 a new amenities building and minor road upgrades will take place and Stage 2 will include demolition of the existing amenities, extension to internal roadways and playground. Council secured \$154,525 in NSW Government grant funding through the Stronger Country Communities Fund to deliver the project.
