578.3MWORKS BUDGET

Council has committed \$78.3 million towards community projects this financial year following adoption of the 2023/24 Operational Plan.

The plan includes Council's budget for the new financial year, where funds will be allocated and how this expenditure is funded.

Almost 20 per cent of this budget, \$14.9 million, has been committed to upgrades for roads, bridges and footpaths. The largest value roads project will be the seal extension of Coricudgy Road at \$2.7 million, with a further \$4.1 million secured from NSW Government grant funding to undertake repairs across the region following the 2022 floods.

Recreational facility upgrades will be undertaken throughout

the region to cater for the growing community's needs. Some of the projects include an all new Adventure Playspace in Kandos, a new amenities building at Victoria Park in Gulgong, and upgrades to Rylstone Showground.

Residents were asked to submit their ideas as part of the development of this year's plan. A variety of submissions were put forward and Council will deliver on some including a new playground at Windeyer and playground upgrade at Charbon (in 2024/25), major field renovation at Waratah Park in Kandos, extension of the walking area along the river at Rylstone and upgrades to playground softfall across the region.

NSW TOP SMALL TOURISM TOWN AWARDS ANNOUNCED

GULGONG WINS BRONZE



Gulgong has won bronze at the NSW Top Tourism Town Awards in the Small Town category (population between 1500 to 5000 residents).

Mudgee was inducted into the Hall of Fame, in recognition of the outstanding achievement in being crowned winner in the Top Tourism Town category at the NSW Top Tourism Awards in 2021 and 2022, and receiving the Australian Top Town Tourism Award in 2021 and 2022. WOOD HEATER SMOKE

Smoke from wood heaters can be a major source of air pollution at this time of year. There are some simple ways to help reduce your heater's impact on the environment. Always burn small, aged logs of dry hardwood. Never burn treated wood or household rubbish. And regularly check your chimney for smoke. By reducing smoke from wood heaters we can all stay warm and breathe easy.

FILL YOUR FOGO BIN

With the cold weather well and truly upon us, your yard may be filling up with leaves and garden debris. Did you know that all garden debris including leaves, lawn clippings, plant cuttings and branches up to 10cm in diameter can be disposed of in your household green Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) bin?

MORE THAN 39 KILOMETRES SEALED IN THREE YEARS

IMPROVING ROADS

Council has sealed 39km of local roads over the last three years with a further 21.3km to be sealed over the next two years.

A number of key projects that have been completed include the sealing of Collector Road Bus Routes including sections of Coxs Creek Road (2.1km), Mebul Road (4.6km) and Pyramul Road (1.2km).

Collector roads are roads that carry

higher volumes of traffic collected from minor and main local roads. These works commenced in October 2020 and were completed in February this year.

Council secured \$1.6m in grant funding through Round One of the NSW Government's Fixing Local Road Program. A further \$500,000 was contributed by Council towards the project.

Council is proudly hosting a Tree Day Event near Glen Willow's new rugby union field on Sunday, 30 July.

Residents are invited to come along and plant trees and shrubs to attract native animals behind Rugby Union field one. Please park in the P4 car park and wear a hat and enclosed shoes. Council hosted three planting days along the Cudgegong River and Lawsons Creek with local disability organisations and schools in May.

More than 1500 tubestocks were planted by 150 volunteers and Council would like to thank all volunteers for their participation. The plantings will provide wildlife habitat and corridors for wildlife to travel from one area to the other as well as improving the overall health of the river systems. These events are made possible with the assistance of Watershed Landcare, Local Land Services, Mudgee Men's Shed and Mudgee Lions Club. The revegetation of the Cudgegong River Catchment was funded by the Australian Government under the Murray-Darling Healthy Rivers Program.

RURAL WASTE COMPLIANCE

One of the ongoing challenges Council and the community face is misuse of Rural Waste Transfer Stations, including dumping of prohibited waste types or incorrectly placing waste in the facility. Council has increased the compliance action at rural waste facilities, issuing clean-up cost notices to those who incorrectly use these facilities.



Council has provided \$16,500 in financial and in-kind assistance to support local events. One-off funding was provided to the Mudgee Mud Dragons, NSW Rural Doctors Network and Central Tablelands Branch Australia Stockhorse. Multi-year funding was provided to Rylstone Show Society, Mudgee Dressage Group and Cudgegong Valley Pioneer Club. Council's Events Assistance Program is designed to assist local community events that benefit the economy.

The total economic value added (EVA) by all industries in the Mid-Western Region is now estimated at \$2.7 billion, representing 27% of the \$10.2 billion EVA in the Orana Region, and 0.4% of the \$654.2 billion EVA in NSW. The total EVA by the region's industries increased by 45% from 2018 to 2022. The EVA by the region's mining industry increased by 86% (to \$1.3 billion) whilst the region's health care and social assistance industry increased by 44% (to \$137.1 million) over the same period.
