


MUDGEE ARTS PRECINCT GOES POP!

Works by some of the greatest international Pop Art creators are now on display at Mudgee Arts Precinct.

Icons of Pop Art: Warhol and Lichtenstein is the first of four major exhibitions to be hosted at the gallery. Highlights include Andy Warhol's Campbell's Soup II — Cheddar Cheese (1969) and Lichtenstein's Reflections on The Scream (1990).

These works are on longterm loan from the National Gallery of Australia through the Commonwealth Government's Sharing the National Collection Program, which will showcase 41 significant pieces in Mudgee over two years.

Upcoming exhibitions will feature David Hockney's Paper Pool series, Lichtenstein's Bull series, and works by Willem de Kooning, Maurice Sendak, Masami Teraoka, Helen Frankenthaler and Frank Stella.

Since launching in 2023, over a million people have enjoyed the national collection closer to home — now it's Mudgee's turn.

\$1.17 MILLION INTO ECONOMY

The region's most beloved festival, Flavours of Mudgee, has returned for its twelfth year with 10,977 people spilling into Mudgee's CBD to taste awardwinning food and wine.

Visitors to the region attending the event spent \$1.17 million locally during their stay based on economic data. More than 60 local stallholders lined

Church and Market Streets in nearperfect conditions.

This year's event was proudly supported through Destination NSW's Regional Event Fund with a \$30,000 marketing grant to help promote the festival and attract visitors to the region.

Planning is already underway for next year's event which will be held on Saturday, 26 September 2026.

"He explained what he did day-to-day, and I thought, I'm interested in the building industry, maybe I'll give it a go," Zane said. "The traineeship with Council popped up, I applied, and they took me on board."

Now a Trainee Building Surveyor with Council, Zane is thriving in a role that combines technical skills, community impact, and time outdoors.

"Our job is to make sure every new home, shed, pool, and retaining wall in the region is safe and compliant under the National Construction Code and Australian Standards."

Balancing work and study can be challenging, but Council's support makes it easier. "Council gives me paid study days each year and covers 100 per cent of my course fees," he said. "In just two years, I'll be fully accredited."

Zane encourages others to consider applying for Council's upcoming traineeships. "Give it a go. It's something I never thought I'd get into, but I'm loving it. Council's a great place to start your career - they support you in every way possible."

INVESTMENT IN LOCAL AGRICULTURE INDUSTRY SALEYARDS UPGRADES

A series of upgrades have recently been completed at the Mudgee Saleyards, aimed at improving functionality, efficiency, and capacity for the region's sheep producers.

The works are part of Council's ongoing commitment to supporting the local agricultural sector and ensuring the facility continues to meet modern industry standards. In addition to the integration of Sheep eID (Electronic Identification) technology, a number of practical improvements have been made to enhance operations for both vendors and buyers.

The height of the selling pens has been increased to provide better visibility and handling, while new gates have been added to larger pens to improve livestock movement and safety. Adjustments to the overall layout have also enabled the creation of an additional 10 pens, expanding the space available for displaying and selling sheep during market days.

These upgrades will help streamline saleyard operations, accommodate growing demand, and support the continued success of the region's thriving livestock industry.



HEALTH CARE ACCOMMODATION

Council's \$55,000 contribution towards a critical accommodation service for cancer patients has been realised with the newly expanded Macquarie Home Stay now open. Glencore contributed a further \$245,000 towards the \$7 million Stage 2 development in Dubbo, along with local donations from The Rotary Club of Mudgee, Rotary Club of Mudgee Sunrise (pictured) and operational support from Can Assist. The facility provides low-cost accommodation for patients receiving treatment at the new Western Cancer Centre. Patients from the Mid-Western Region are the second highest users of the facility, behind Cobar. Since its completion in February, 2000 guests have made use of the accommodation.



RECREATION STRATEGY INDOOR POOL PLANNING

Council has adopted its updated Recreation Strategy, setting a clear direction for the planning, development and management of recreation facilities and opportunities across the region over the next 10 years.

Building on the 2013 Strategy, the updated document reflects Council's ongoing commitment to both active and passive recreational pursuits, while responding to evolving community needs and participation trends.

Fifty-three submissions were received on the strategy during the consultation period. Based on community input, Council will now prioritise feasibility planning of the Indoor Swimming Complex in the short term (2-3 years) to further investigate a facility, and bring forward the Public Convenience Strategy Action Item to the short term (2-3 years). Council has already committed funding in its 2025/26 Operational Plan to progress a feasibility study for an indoor sports facility.
